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<sup>191</sup> Akin to continuing debates around what is national cinema, the question of what is a Jamaican film is not easily answered. Warner (1992, 52; 2000, 71) has defined a Caribbean film as a film that is “produced in the region by and with a majority of Caribbean personnel, and whose conception, realization and flavour present a distinct Caribbean world view.” For the purpose of this overview, I largely follow Warner’s definition. In addition, while Warner (1992, 52) did not (yet) “include films by Caribbean filmmakers that are set outside the Caribbean,” in this overview I have included films made by Jamaican diasporic filmmakers. Furthermore, I have only selected (completed) Jamaican feature-length fiction films that have had an official theatrical release and/or international film festival selection.
